Cherry Class Expectations

- The children will be introduced to the KS1 curriculum in the Autumn Term and should be fully emersed by the start of the Spring Term.
- They will continue to learn through continuous provision and play-based learning in the classroom and in our outside area.
- The children will be encouraged to become more independent, for example, getting themselves dressed and undressed for PE and selecting their tools for learning.



Willow Class Expectations

- The children will be encouraged to become increasingly independent and organised as the year goes on, to enable them to be ready to progress to KS2 by the end of the year.
- The children will continue to learn in different ways and will be given some choice in their learning and in how they challenge themselves.
- There will still be lots of continuous provision available to the children and plenty of play-based learning both inside and outside the classroom.



Learning at school

Each class will base their learning around a topic. Learning will be both inside and outside of the classroom and will happen in groups, pairs and individually. Learning will be both teacher directed and child lead. Some learning will be recorded in books, but sometimes through pupil voice and a photo being taken.









Home Learning

 Reading - Most children will be bringing home a RWInc book in their reading folders, which will be changed by your child's reading teacher once they have read the book three times in school. Some Year 2 Children will be choosing their own book from the classroom or taking an Accelerated Reader home.

Reading



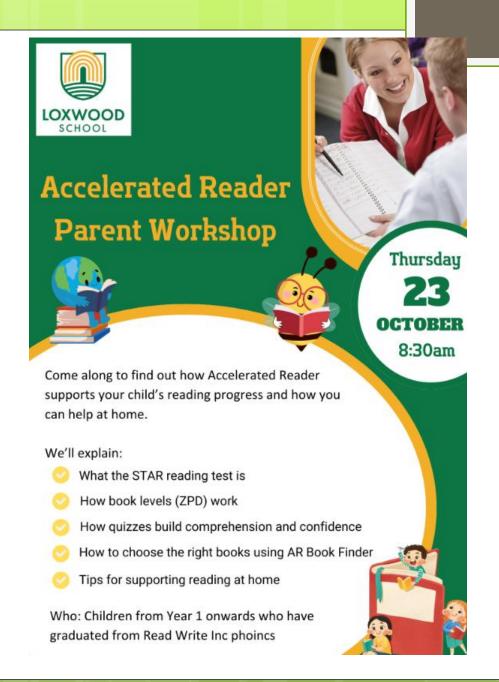
We recommend that you try to read with your child five times a week for approximately 10mins. We appreciate family life is busy, but any time you dedicate to practising reading skills will be beneficial to your child's development. This can also be sharing a book together with you reading to them, as this is a vital part of developing a love of reading and is also vital in helping to increase their vocabulary.

At Home

We would like you to record your child's reading progress at home in their yellow reading log. This doesn't need to be every time that they read, but as often as you can. Your comments are so helpful for us, as they enable us to form a picture of what your child can do and what progress they are making. We will check the reading records as often as we can and reply to any queries as soon as possible. Sending it in in your child's hand is often helpful. House points are awarded for reading at home and recorded reads add to our whole school total!

At School

We assess the children's reading at school in many ways; group reading, paired reading, whole class reading and sometimes 1:1 reading. We record our assessments in school rather than in the home reading record and will share progress with you in the usual way during Parent Consultation Meetings. If you have any concerns or questions at any time, do feel free to come and have a chat.

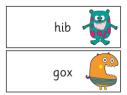


Children who have graduated from phonics in Year 1 or 2 will join the Accelerated Reader programme, once their reading is fluent and they are ready.

Phonics in Year 1 and 2

All children practise their sounds as part of the curriculum.





We follow the Read Write Inc scheme as a school.

Reception, Year 1 and 2 children are put into groups according to the sounds they already know, so children focus on the appropriate sounds for their current need. (These groups are not static and are open to change). We assess their phonics regularly so that we can ensure that all children are in the correct group.

At the end of Year 1 children undertake a Phonic Screen Assessment. This is a national assessment that happens in all schools. It is undertaken with their class teacher and takes about 10 minutes, 1-1 per child. Children are required to segment and blend words and non-words containing the phonemes that they have already been taught in school. This is something that is familiar to the children already. Children in Year 2, who did not achieve the required pass in Year 1, will retake the assessment also.

Year 2 children who have been assessed as having graduated from phonics will join a reading comprehension group to support their fluency, comprehension, spelling and grammar skills.

Mastering Number

Mastering Number is a national programme for children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2. It helps them build strong foundations in maths by developing a deep understanding of numbers.

What happens in school?

- Children take part in short daily sessions (10-15 minutes).
- They use resources like bead strings, counters and rekenreks (a special counting frame) to explore numbers in different ways.
- The focus is on confidence, fluency and understanding, not just getting answers quickly.

Why is it important?

- It gives children a secure base for later maths, like addition and multiplication.
- · It helps prevent gaps in understanding.
- It makes maths fun and engaging.

How can parents help?

- Talk about numbers in everyday life.
- Play counting and number games.
- Encourage children to explain their thinking
